Feedback -What will Nelson be Like in 50 years, Nelson 2060

"Council as the ultimate leader has not identified itself"

The democratic representative, inclusive and transparent processes must be the primary goal, not leadership. Empowerment in goal one is the operative word.

- On re-reading the Draft of Nelson 2060 after a break I am overwhelmed that the vision and goals are nebulous romanticism, in the tradition of communities and ideals that sprang up in the UK in opposition to the industrial cities such as Manchester, and the hell-hole of parts of London from the 1800s. ("The outstanding lifestyles immersed in nature and strong communities".)
- The idea of a strong economy built on knowledge and understanding has everyone pay (p.17) without any real recognition of disparities between rich and poor, the increasing electronic divide, and that groups of people will exist who need subsidies. The document wants voluntarism from the people without job creation references. True, it does say "eliminate conditions that undermine people's capacity to meet their basic needs", but that is not direct support to the poor in society, only a manipulation of conditions by a management of leaders.
- The Draft also mentions "inclusive and transparent processes". This phrase must be lifted up into a primary goal else have the whole of the civics phrases (recognised as being scattered through the Draft), dealt with quite separately to sustainability of the environment.
- The environmental sectors are sound and should be part of any today's Council forward planning to do with water, sewage and the like. They can stand alone. If we put them forward with such emphasis, which I support, we should match that weight with a representative local democracy that identifies the management structure and means for representation. I know the objective is to find new means of collaboration. For the moment they are electronic call centre interviews with people who put themselves forward as a panel of interviewees, and in the future it could be on-line polling. This neutralizes group mobilization, and is a marketing plan for exactly that.
- The tone of the Draft is middle class upwardly mobile environmentally focused affluence
 and leadership without representation. Representation should be added to inclusive and
 transparent processes empowerment and representation and leadership dropped down
 the priorities and placed within a corporate or representative model. I have heard it is an
 ageless document. Children are given no mention but schools, sport and arts societies are
 as the means to reach the young, which is just continuing to have adult contact.
- No civil structure is offered for the means by which people's needs are perceived. There is
 no corporate or representative model and no town plan taking Nelson forward. This is a
 great oversight given elections are drawing close. It only has fine bones of a potential brief

that in town planning history is a good 30 years old, even dating back to the garden city town planning movement of the Americans. No such planner was in the Taskforce.

- Council itself as the ultimate leader has not identified itself and that is a gaping hole. We know central government wants control and has passed the new local government law to achieve that. We need to know for the future what management frame our "leaders" will front with to central authority. Can Council in fact have one or is it seamless management from the centre? "Partnerships" can be with central government itself and corporations. The lack of a council model for itself was pre-emptive of the change in legislation and must now be created as an outcome of taking submissions. We must have in the Draft the exemplary model of inclusive and transparent representative democracy as the first goal of any Vision towards 2060. That has not been bought forward as a primary objective from the original brief.
- I appreciate that we can all engage with the environment through the mythologies, mixed race genealogies and knowledge of Maori with Chatham Islanders as the first peoples. However both Maori and Pakeha are imbued with the Western and Eastern traditions of the many cultures we have and can expect to have (for instance the biblical and academic histories of the ancient Egyptians, Persians, Arabs and Greeks, and the Magna Carta). This combined background must be recognised as valid knowledge in the Draft that we also seek, not just romanticized guardianship and protection to place Maori political authority in the "charter" with the Treaty at a level already voted against by the people. The document asserts Maori authority in a way it barely approaches for the Council itself, except to say Council is the ultimate leader. People together however can be guardians and protectors with scientific knowledge, not necessarily cultural.
- As said, another whole series of conversations need to be had around civil society once
 the Draft is accepted and I urge Council to set them up as an outcome of calling for
 community submissions with the intention of empowering not leading its citizens.
- The sense one gets is that the conversations have already been had, the outcome is a foregone conclusion; it is a leadership model central government wants and submissions will change little. That the people have been consulted and they have not considered a society wider than the narrow range of management skills represented in the Taskforce, and the university professor's presentation was elitist and pre-emptive of the change to the local government act. Council can challenge central government with this Draft, and go once again to the community to include not the managers of the lower income population, but the people themselves. They have not represented themselves to date. That is the divide.

Firstly: I fully support this strategy, and recognise, with gratitude, the hard work that has gone into creating a framework of policies to get from the current way of thinking, to how we want it to be in fifty years from now. And also commend you on a beautifully presented document with lots of great photos, especially of children who will be the recipients of this vision.

Page 7 Blue box states that the 2060 strategy requires wider regional response.

This is really important and its impossible to think about Nelsons future without including the TOS region of at least Tasman District, and Marlborough is also important. There were regional people on the Task force and it would be good to know how they saw this NCC initiative being assisted, or better still joined in, by neighbours. The councils dont have to amalgamate to work together on this important issue.

Page 8

Our economy

Do you mean Nelson the region or NCC? Supply lines also disrupted by floods. [There is a problem with Just in Time supermarkets delivery philosophy, and no big warehouse storage in Nelson Region. Any emergency cutting the supply line to Christchurch will have Nelson Region very hungry! Can both Councils work on that?]

Page 9

Energy and resource scarcity

Why does Nelson have such a high per capita use of fossil fuels? Which sector? Is this because we don't have rail? [I realise I could research this in the Cawthron document, but haven't had time. This anomaly is a key place to start work on reducing GHG emissions.]

Planning together

The other local authorities TDC and MDC are also crucial. Is 2060 on any of the joint TOS agendas??

Page 14 -

Goals: I see on page 42 the document talks about the importance of measuring progress. Very true, but some goals are so hard to find good ways to monitor them you might decide not to have

them, but that would be a pity. The hardest part of setting goals is to work out how to measure the progress towards them and I hope there are specialists who can help you with that.

Page 17

How we might do, it last bullet point.

Would council planners be able to assist other organisations? The 2060 vision Sustainability principles and decision framework might be hard for other organisations to understand easily, and some professional assistance would help it happen.

This submission has been prepared by the Nelson Local Issues Group, Nelson Branch National Council of Women (NCW), a group of women within the Nelson Branch NCW who are particularly interested in issues concerning Nelson.

In reply to questions as listed:

1 What do you think of Nelson 2060, is it the inspiring future you want? We think that Nelson 2060 is a document that waffles around the obvious. The speed of change makes it very difficult to visualize what a city will look like and how it will function in 2060. We note that many now shop on line - whether this trend will lead to the demise of shops is as yet unknown.

As stated in Issue 15 Framing our future there should be integrated regional planning, sufficient arable land to feed us, good urban planning, (including building standards that encourage solar heating and prevent trees from shading houses and gardens), and good quality air and water.

- 2. Do you see yourself as having a part to play helping Nelson achieve the vision? Our group takes time, and has interest in, thinking about local government issues as they arise, and to make submissions when our discussion decides it is appropriate.
- 3 What are you already doing to helping Nelson achieve the vision? See answer to 2.
- 4 If you were going to take action would Nelson 2060 be helpful? No
- 5 What else could help you take action?

We already take some action. It would help raise interest if public felt it was listened to eg completion of heritage railway to Trafalgar Street and beyond seems to have been completely dropped in spite of broad public support; and concerns that loading bays of commercial buildings which front onto main roads are not good urban design

are still there (eg Rebel Sports and Briscoes on Rutherford Street opposite Theatre Royal).

6 Are you interested in working together, either with Council or other groups and organisations?

We think this is already happening and as NCWNZ is an organisation of organisations there is good networking with other groups and we participate in public consultations and submissions to Council

7 Do you have any comments or thoughts?

Need to recognize population is aging and opportunities for employment of younger people need to be encouraged. NMIT's presence helps maintain population balance.

We suggest that the long drawn out process of this consultation and the production of such a glossy, coloured document is money not well spent. A strategy is a working document that should be simple and succinct, the current document Nelson 2060 may 'look good' but does not actually say a lot. Attached is submission made in October 2011 which shows that we have not come very far towards finalising a strategy.

It is good to see the development of community gardens, page 21, however the last vestiges of horticultural land should be preserved as is and not 'developed'.

MOVED by Cr MA Hartley, seconded Cr W Walker:

That the Regional Development and Operations Committee:

- a) encourages the government to conclude negotiations on the Trans-Pacific Partnership and Free Trade Agreements in a way that provides net positive benefits for Auckland and New Zealand, that is, provided the Partnership and Agreements achieve the following objectives:
 - i. Continues to allow the Auckland Council and other councils, if they so choose, to adopt procurement policies that provide for a degree of local preference; to choose whether particular services or facilities are provided in house, by council-controlled organisations (CCOs) or by contracting out; or to require higher health and safety, environmental protection, employment rights and conditions, community participation, animal protection or human rights standards than national or international minimum standards.
 - ii. Maintains good diplomatic and trade relations and partnerships for Auckland and New Zealand with other major trading partners not included in the agreement, including with China.
 - iii. Provides substantially increased access for our agriculture exports, particularly those from the Auckland region into the US market;
 - iv. Does not undermine PHARMAC, raise the cost of medical treatments and medicines or threaten public health measures, such as tobacco control;
 - v. Does not give overseas investors or suppliers any greater rights than domestic investors and suppliers, such as through introducing investor-State Dispute Settlement, or reduce our ability to control overseas investment or finance;
 - vi. Does not expand intellectual property rights and enforcement in excess of current law;
 - vii. Does not weaken our public services, require privatisation, hinder reversal of privatisations, or increase the commercialisation of government or of Auckland Council or other local government organisations;
 - viii. Does not reduce our flexibility to support local economic and industry development and encourage good employment and environmental practices and initiatives like Council Cadetships, COMET and the Mayor's Taskforce for Jobs which enable marginalised young people to develop their skills and transition into meaningful employment;
 - ix. Contains enforceable labour clauses requiring adherence to core International Labour Organisation conventions and preventing reduction of labour rights for trade or investment advantage;
 - x. Contains enforceable environmental clauses preventing reduction of environmental standards for trade or investment advantage;
 - xi. Has general exceptions to protect human rights, the environment, the Treaty of Waitangi, and New Zealand's economic and financial stability;
 - xii. Has been negotiated with real public consultation including regular public releases of drafts of the text of the agreement, and ratification being conditional on a full social, environmental and economic impact assessment including public submissions.

Hi Ruth,

thanks very much for confirming receipt of my submission. Other than indicated I don't wish to present anything in person, but as the TPPA is such an important issue for this country and all of us please kindly include the following text into my submission:

Our government is negotiating the Trans-Pacific Partnership Agreement with eleven Asian and Pacific Rim countries including the United States behind closed doors. If it goes ahead, we risk serious damage to our innovative economy, our pristine environment, our health, and the ability to shape our own future on a national and local level. I therefore urge the Nelson City Council to adopt the Auckland City TPPA Resolution to ensure that our local government will not lose it's ability to make decision which are best for its people.

The Agreement is being negotiated in secret, which is not acceptable. We live in a democracy and have the right to know what is done in our name and to have a say.

From what has been exposed so far, if the negotiations are completed it will become much harder for the New Zealand government to look after our environment, promote health, protect workers and consumers, and promote the public interest with no apparant benefit for New Zealand:

- 1. Most restrictions on foreign investment will be frozen and rolled back even further.
- 2. Big overseas companies will be able to sue the New Zealand government for millions in damages in secretive offshore tribunals, claiming that new laws and regulations (for example, a ban on fracking, smoking control laws, or a cap on electricity prices) have seriously undermined the value of their investments.
- 3. Medicines will become more expensive as big pharmaceutical companies gain more influence over PHARMAC, and restrictions are placed on generic medicines.
- 4. Copyright laws will be toughened and more harshly enforced, restricting internet freedom and access to information, costing libraries, schools, and businesses, and stifling innovation.
- 5. Parallel importing will be banned, meaning that New Zealanders, especially the poor, will have to pay far more for all sorts of ordinary products.
- 6. Foreign banks, insurance companies and money traders will gain more powers to challenge laws designed to prevent another financial crisis; and overseas property dealers could contest moves to burst the property bubble, such as a capital gains tax.

There are plenty of other things to be concerned about and we have good reason to believe that the TPPA is solely negotiated for big corporations and not in the interest of ordinary kiwis.

Our government says it is acting in New Zealand's best interest. If they really believe that, they should bring the negotiations into the open, and provide evidence of concrete benefits to outweigh the serious costs.

That is what democracy requires and this is why the Nelson City Council should adopt the Auckland City Resolution.

Dear sir/madam

In the sustainable energy section of the proposed 2060 strategy it was good to note that Nelson's high sunshine hours was seen as a positive opportunity to reduce the region's total dependence on external energy sources. However, it surprised me to see that the only use of the sun that received a mention was for water heating. While encouraging an increase in this technology would have significant benefits in reducing energy use I wondered why there was no mention of Council support or encouragement for people / businesses to also use the sun to generate power with solar panels.

If there were incentives for people to install solar panels the power generated could be used either directly by the primary generator - resulting in reduced power demand from the regional grid - or the amount of power would be measured and fed into the regional grid for general use, and the amount fed into the grid would be deducted from the client's monthly usage. Both end uses of this power generation would result in financial savings for the power generator and whatever money is saved in energy costs would pass into other sectors of the economy.

Combining solar power production with solar water heating would result in a larger overall reduction in the region's imported energy requirements. As this would benefit the whole local economy, and as financial benefit is the most effective way to alter attitudes, the Council might be able to offer rates concessions or reduced permitting fees for new buildings that incorporate these solar technologies.

Perhaps the Council could instigate a campaign for raising local awareness and lobbying central Government and power companies to improve and encourage access to available technologies. They could also look into the feasibility of setting an example and installing solar panels on the Council buildings.

I definitely think that the 2060 strategy should mention an increased use of solar power as one of its goals under either the sustainability or climate change sections of the document.

The money saved could have gone towards having the CBD streets cleaned daily instead of only three times a week as at present – this does not lead to a city to be proud of - again as the document suggests.

Goal 4 page 21

Unless there is going to be some policy on tree height neighbours will find themselves with shady gardens making growing vegetables particularly difficult in the winter. Home gardens need to be considered as well as commercial ones.

Goal 6 page 25

Current home building restrictions do not encourage construction to take advantage of solar heating in all homes. If solar heating of homes and water and good use of sun to heat homes in the winter was encouraged this would help fuel efficiency. Nelson 2060 - The Vision

The New Zealand Historic Places Trust (NZHPT) commends the development of a Vision statement 2060 for the City. We support the themes listed in the draft paper for comment, but note the omission of a theme around heritage.

We would suggest an optional approach on this- one is that heritage is recognised broadly as integral to each of the four themes proposed, or secondly, the addition of a separate theme.

There should be an introductory section about the history and culture of the city and the role of heritage in competitive advantage and a point of difference — heritage providing inspiration and evoking memory, uniqueness of mineral belt, the early Wakefield settlement, industries such as forestry, gold mining, maritime, fishing and aquaculture, horticulture and hops and tobacco, the beginnings of the first public education system in New Zealand, scientific study and research and Victorian buildings.

Under Theme 1 — Urban Design, heritage has a broad contribution to make to the character of nelson and its landscapes — a large collection of timber Victorian buildings and the role of heritage in sustainability.

Theme 2 in our view should be renamed Connected with our natural and historic environment. The Whakatu Nelson Heritage Strategy has a vision valuing, protecting and celebrating the City's distinctive heritage which contributes to its identity and sense of belonging.

Theme 3 Economy and Knowledge — there is plenty of information around on historic heritage and the economy. Donovan Rypkema, an international expert on sustainability and economic benefits of historic preservation was in New Zealand last year speaking in the main centres. We have included with this submission a paper on this subject which will be useful to Council.

Under Theme 4 Leadership and Partnership — the Nelson City Council is kaitiaki of heritage assets demonstrating leadership in care and celebrating historic and cultural heritage and a responsibility to manage these assets.

Nelson has a rich heritage landscape with many places of national heritage significance. The timing of Vision Nelson 2060 fits well with the proposed upgrade of Council's heritage inventory adding a number of identified heritage places to the Resource Management Plan, which will increase the appreciation for and protection of places historic heritage significance, including precinct areas in the City.

The NZHPT supports the development of Vision 2060

 - Does not weaken our public services, require privatisation, hinder reversal of privatisations, or increase the commercialisation of government or of

Does not reduce our flexibility to support local economic, and industry development and encourage good employment and environmental practices and initiatives like Gouncil Cadetships, GOMET and the Mayor's Taskforce for Jobs which enable marginalised young people to develop their skills and transition into meaningful employment;
 - Contains enforceable labour clauses requiring adherence to core International Labour Organisation conventions and preventing reduction of labour rights for trade or investment advantage;

The Trans-Pacific Partnership Agreement (TPPA) is a free trade and investment agreement being negotiated between eleven Asian and Pacific-rim countries, including the United States. The TPPA could have a huge effect on the lives of ordinary kiwis — if it goes ahead, we risk damage to our economy, our environment, our health, and the ability to shape our own future.

Secret negotiations

The TPPA negotiations are conducted in secret, what we know about the TPPA comes from leaked documents and detective work. We live in a democracy, which means we have the right to know what is done in our name and to have a say,

So what's troubling about the TPPA?

From what we know so far, if the negotiations are completed it will become much harder for the New Zealand government to look after our environment, promote health, protect workers and consumers, and promote the public interest:

- Most restrictions on foreign investment will be frozen and rolled back even further.
- 2. Big overseas companies will be able to sue the New Zealand government for millions in damages in secretive offshore tribunals, claiming that new laws and regulations (for example, a ban on fracking, smoking control laws, or a cap on electricity prices) have seriously undermined the value of their investments.
- 3. Medicines will become more expensive as big pharmaceutical companies gain more influence over PHARMAC, and restrictions are placed on generic medicines.
- 4. Copyright laws will be toughened and more harshly enforced, restricting internet freedom and access to information, costing libraries, schools, and businesses, and stifling innovation.
- 5. Parallel importing will be banned, meaning that New Zealanders, especially the poor, will have to pay far more for all sorts of ordinary products.
- 6. Foreign banks, insurance companies and money traders will gain more powers to challenge laws designed to prevent another financial crisis; and overseas property dealers could contest moves to burst the property bubble, such as a capital gains tax.



SUBMISSION ON DRAFT STRATEGY "FRAMING OUR FUTURE"

Nelson geologist and historian, Dr Mike Johnston, in his book "High Hopes", documents a time in Nelson history where a form of "copper fever" took over the then young colony. Many citizens, convinced that the province was about to experience its own form of a minerals boom based on the resources in the Mineral Belt, invested heavily in locally based mining ventures such as the copper mining undertaken in Aniseed Valley. Unfortunately, inadequate appraisal of the mineral resource had been performed and the ventures failed. A number of citizens were bankrupted as a result of the failures. Perhaps the biggest tragedy was that these ventures consumed capital that could have otherwise been used to far greater effect in developing farms and industry within Nelson. To that extent Nelson was all the poorer for bad investment decisions, based on poor data, despite the initial "high hopes" held.

Reading "Framing our Future – Towards Nelson 2060" I can't help but think that we are about to experience a 21st century version of "copper fever" except this time it is "climate change fever". The Strategy sets the stage for wasteful investment and policy development which will only serve to impoverish Nelson rather than enhance the welfare of its citizens. As with the failed minerals ventures, a number of the proposed goals in the draft strategy are based on emotive or "feel good" factors rather than economic reality. In some places the goals have been developed in response to information which is just plain wrong. That is hardly a good foundation for wise investment of scarce resource.

Whilst the draft strategy is pitched as a sustainability strategy, sustainability is highly dependent on a healthy economy. If a community becomes impoverished as a result of bad governance, the community suffers and population will drift to areas of greater opportunity. A sustainability strategy doesn't exist on its own, it must form part of the greater long term strategy for Nelson.

Surely one goal for a sustainability strategy must be for the council to maintain the level of rates increases at less than the rate of inflation, without adding to debt. Continued borrowing by Council is unsustainable and places a burden on future generations. It is surprising that the draft strategy doesn't contain any reference to sustainable funding policies.

It is very disappointing that the draft strategy doesn't even identify remediation of Nelson's stormwater drainage as something that should be a goal. That means Nelsonians could well be waiting for another 50 years before adequate, basic infrastructure is put in place. There is no goal set to deal with heavy trucks and traffic volumes on Rocks Rd—the current situation is an affront to Nelson and most Nelsonians would rank dealing with this a far higher objective than growing more food. Again, provision of basic transportation infrastructure is essential to the sustainability of the region. More cycleways aren't going solve Nelson's transportation issues.

The draft strategy is heavily predicated on the supposed threats posed by climate change. Indeed, the background to the draft strategy states:-

"The effects of greenhouse gases and changing climate patterns on our planet are already becoming evident. They include extreme weather events, increased global average air and ocean temperatures, widespread melting of snow and ice and a rising global average sea level."

In actuality, as recently noted by the UK Met office, "there has been no statistically significant increase in the world's temperature since 1997".

The draft strategy is really a Trojan horse for Council to adopt the Green Party manifesto. Some parts of the draft strategy mirror Green Party policy wording.

Two goals in particular within the draft strategy have serious failings and should be discarded. These are Goal 4 – "We produce more of our own food" and Goal 6 – "We move from using fossil fuels to renewable energy sources".

Goal 4 is just plain bizarre and is the kind of goal that one might have expected from a mediaeval village under imminent threat of siege. It is weird goal to say the least for a 21st century city living in the modern world in a modern economy and can only be a product of the fervent imaginations of gloom-merchants/catastrophists/scaremongers and/or survivalists. In detailing the background to this goal it is stated that:-

"We rely on areas outside of Nelson to produce the food and other products we need so we're at risk from changes in price and supply. Supply lines can be disrupted by a major disaster, such as an earthquake. We can protect our livelihoods and will be able to withstand shocks better by producing and supplying more of our own basic requirements such as food, building materials and local energy and at the same time support our local economy."

This statement displays a kind of "fortress" mentality which, if followed by every other city in New Zealand would result in substantial economic inefficiencies. It is totally erroneous to say that Nelson relies on other areas to produce our food — one only needs to look at the vast quantities of fish; fruit and dairy products that are exported out of Nelson to realize that this statement is just not true. Our local economy is heavily weighted towards food production and export. To adopt an anti-trading stance is counterproductive to Nelson's economic interest. And to suggest that our supply lines are vulnerable in the event of an earthquake is unfounded scaremongering at best. Despite the ravages of the Christchurch earthquake and its associated disruption there has never been any suggestion that Christchurch residents went without food for any length of time (other than Marmite) or starved.

On its own Goal 4 might appear to be innocuous enough except, if adopted, the draft strategy signals that measures such as land use planning (code for prohibiting subdivisions) will follow. The natural consequence of such a policy is that residential

land will become a scarce resource, the price of it will increase and its affordability will decrease. That would have an adverse effect on Nelson's ability to attract new residents and detract from economic welfare – all for the sake of a policy based on some survivalist view of the world.

Goal 6 is another "feel good" goal which, if implemented, could result in substantial loss of economic value for the region and hence diverting capital from productive use to areas of low value. The draft strategy holds up Nelson Airport as a shining example of the way forward through its use of 44 photovoltaic panels and makes the extraordinary claim that "the investment in solar panels makes sense financially". That is an outright falsity and counter to international experience which shows that solar power generation still requires massive subsidies to be viable. The draft strategy provides no supporting evidence for this outrageous claim, which would easily be proved or disproved if Nelson Airport were to release details on its power purchases prior to installation of the panels and after installation, along with details of the capital cost of the equipment. Whilst the solar panels might give everyone a cuddly feel-good feeling the fact is they were purchased using money that could have otherwise been dividended to Council and used for other more productive purposes. The panels represent an expensive PR exercise. Worse still, the panels have probably caused a net increase in global CO2 emissions. Manufacture of solar panels is energy intensive with between 350 Kg and 1500 Kg of CO2 being generated per square metre of solar panel. Given that 100% of electricity generation in the South Island is already from renewable sources, and additional generation will only result in spill of hydro water, the airport installation is likely to have added to net emissions, not reduced them.

Nelson does not have an abundance of renewable energy sources. Other than solar, use of which would result in prohibitive energy costs relative to the rest of the country, biofuels would represent the next possible alternative. As has been shown with the US ethanol industry, biofuels in themselves pose many problems including diversion of farmland from food production to energy production; ramped up food prices; and a dependence on subsidies. On current knowledge, it is not a feasible strategy for Nelson to become self-sufficient on its own renewable energy.

In NZ we already have in place a mechanism to ensure that emission reductions occur in the economically most efficient manner. The mechanism is called the Emissions Trading Scheme (ETS) and places a price on carbon. That price at the moment is around \$2/t. If Council really wished to see Nelson play a part in reducing emissions it should buy up Carbon credits at \$2/t and ask that they be deleted from the Register. That would help the price of carbon credits to increase, thereby encouraging industry and carbon generating activities to invest in reducing their emissions. Any activities Council proposes to undertake to reduce carbon emissions, such as installation of further photovoltaic panels, should be evaluated against the alternative of purchasing carbon credits in order to ensure that the desired end goal is being achieved at the lowest possible cost.

Unfortunately, Goal 6 does not seem to weigh up costs and benefits or evaluate whether the desired goal (reduction in emissions) is being achieved in an economically efficient

manner or not. As formulated, Goal 6 could see substantial investment made for very little tangible result. It is a goal formulated on "feel good" ideals rather that rational thought.

Perhaps the most disappointing thing about the draft strategy is it does not explicitly deal with three fundamental goals which should be high priority if Nelson is to achieve the vision set out. The goals that are missing are:

- 1. Creating Opportunities for Young Nelsonians;
- 2. Ensuring Nelson Infrastructure Fosters Economic Growth and Wellbeing
- 3. Ensuring that rates increases in the long term don't exceed the rate of inflation, without increasing Council's debt burden.

Income data from 2006 shows the median income in Nelson then was \$23,100 compared with \$28,000 in Wellington. Only 14% of Nelsonians earned more than \$50,000 p.a. compared with 23.6% of Wellingtonians. Since then, if anything the wage disparity has increased. For many decades Nelson has seen its smartest, most talented young people leave the district due to lack of opportunity. The draft strategy does not explicitly deal with this issue, yet Nelson will not achieve the vision set out if it can't attract and retain talented and educated young people. That should be the most fundamental goal of the draft strategy yet it is a mere footnote. There are examples of other regions in NZ developing strategies to attract and retain their talented young people eg Southland.

The second fundamental building block for economic prosperity is infrastructure. In particular it is a damning indictment on past Councils that we still have heavy traffic travelling around a world class waterfront. It has been remiss of Council to allow this to continue for so long. There is an irony in the fact that the draft strategy is so concerned about the possible disruption that might occur to food supplies in the event of an earthquake but completely ignores the vulnerability the city has to the far more likely event of Rocks Rd being out of action (as has happened in very recent times).

In short, the draft strategy needs amendment to reflect goals well founded in economic rationality rather than warm fuzzies. Currently the strategy reads like a Green Party manifesto document.



Absolutely. The arrangement of conservation groups and the MTB Club to have 'partnerships' with Parks and Facilities who singelhandedly make decisions that changes the usage of public land without public consultations is WRONG and unlawful.

Codger's is a perfect example where the council bypassed any public consultations in regards to the increased development and status of a MTB Park.

7. Do you have any other comments or thoughts?

I engage in three areas that I feel passionate or strongly about.

- 1. Infra structure: Stormwater drains around Nelson need attention. Damp and cold houses create unnecessary health issues because of inadequate or non existent surface water drains.
- 2. Safe roads, paths and tracks for walkers and drivers around Nelson: The Codger's area in the Brook is a mess. Lack of parking, bikers flying down the street the wrong way, or down the footpaths, some track intersections have blind corners, bikers freedom camp in the Brook Valley Parks.

The easy access to Codger's tracks are drawing inexperienced bikers to the park. There are relatively many bikers that injure themselves biking. What can be done to protect walkers from these bikers? There are not enough nicely graded and shaded walks in Nelson for walkers to go elsewhere.

3. Sufficient variety of walks where I can exercise my dog. A dog is an excellent motivator to start living a healthier life or prevent isolation.

I would like the council to steered away from business enterprises and concentrated on council core business. I am horrified that tourists are looked upon as 'cash cows' or that my rates are spent on supporting the creation of businesses.

I do find it difficult to hear that the council cannot afford to fix past mistakes in regards to stormwater when council wants to give \$6 million to the Suter Gallery or \$1 million towards pest fencing of the Brook Sanctuary. I would love to be a philantropist, but unfortunately I cannot afford to do so.

Yes Nelson 2060 is very inspiring in many ways and reflects the future I want. I particularly like the emphasis on being ecologically exemplary and reducing the use of chemicals - personally, I would like to see this statement strengthened further by saying we will minimise and/or strive to eliminate the use of chemicals in the environment. Organic/bio dynamic is the way to go to keep the land, the water and our people healthy.

Yes, everybody has a part to play - together we can make a difference, together we get there faster.

Thank you for this opportunity.

I think it is an inspiring vision for our future and the place I want to spend the rest of my life.

My comments to particular goals are:

Goal 1: Encouragement of leaders is great. I consider it NCC's role to bring leaders together often and for specific issues to ensure the vision is achieved.

Goal 2: Continue opportunities for everyone to participate in decision making. Ensure once decisions are made that they are then not 'put on the back burner' and the momentum is lost. This is very disheartening for citizens. There needs to be a process to keep goodwill and engagement with the wider community in place to sustain the actions to achieve the vision over the next 50 years – regardless of any governance changes.

Goals 3 and 4: They are both vital for our health and wellbeing and must not be compromised. The growing of edible fruits and foods in public places is fantastic and a great way for young and old people to be involved with healthy food production.

Goal 5: I agree. Good communication processes and networks are necessary for this. I think it is one of NCC's roles to drive/manage/assist with the maintenance of such networks.

Goals 6 and 7: Yes, I agree and NCC needs to be the driving force leading/facilitating these goals. Our economy needs to thrive but not at the expense of our health and wellbeing. Example: NCC needs to take a strong stand on the number of fast food outlets in the city and where they are placed. Burger King at the entrance to our CBD is a very poor image. Some countries don't allow large advertising boards. We could do the same.

Goal 8: Yes, I agree. NCC needs to be facilitating relationships between education and industry.

Goal 9: Yes, I agree. It is vital that NCC has strong links into all aspects of the community. That it sets a goal of reducing the gap between the 'haves' and the 'have nots' which has been growing rapidly in the last 20 years.

Examples: Affordable housing for all that is healthy to live in. Good, affordable and accessible public transport. Public amenities that everyone can enjoy and will improve their health and fitness – sports grounds, parks, bike and walkways including walkways within and between subdivisions so that people can get up onto the tops of the hills.

It is important that NCC goes on supporting community based organisations that work hard to improve the lives of the less fortunate. We need to work together as it is difficult for such voluntary groups to raise funds on their own accord to meet their costs. The work done by these groups contribute to NCC's vision – we need each other.

Goal 10: Yes I agree. It is a pity it is so expensive to take waste to the refuse centre. Some communities could benefit from free rubbish pick up to reduce the build up of back yard rubbish. Fast food outlets could be charged more rates to make up for the rubbish they create all around the city streets eg McDonalds, Burger King.

I am a member of Community Workers Training and Support Trust and through that organisation and others that I am part of I will continue to participate in community activities and responses to NCC's requests for feedback.

At current rates (according to the IEA) we should expect 3.5 degrees of warming by 2050. according to Price Waterhouse coopers it'll be 6 degrees by 2100. This is pretty profound, the carrying capacity of the planet will be much lower and the issues facing us will be huge on fronts. Famine/effects of regular severe weather events (NIWA tell us to expect what are currently 1 in 200 year events to come every few years. mass migration is to be expected. regular and severe droughts. To be naive about what is clearly our trajectory and the real challenges we will face and represent Nelson in 2060 in the way that the document does reminds me of Huxely's Brave New World. The euphemistic way climate change is described is shameful as it minimises the precieved risk in the minds of readers of this document who in many cases see you as an authority.

5. What else could help you to take action

I'm open to suggestions? I think I am doig everything I can. I use less than 2kw/hr of energy per day which is generated from PV. I cycle to work. I have the second most efficient car in NZ but wish I could live without one which I cannot due to the state of our public transport system. It is not what I should do and this question is intentionally framed to throw the focus once again onto the individual. Council needs to be brave enough to heavily subsidise public transport until usage numbers are high enough to make it economically viable at very low cost per passenger. Our Nbus is ridiculously expensive compared to public transport elsewhere. Cost comparisons to prove its affordability are flawed as they take off the cost of car ownership from the consideration of a bus user when in Nelson a bus user would generally still hold onto a car due to the logistical challenges of living in a town with historical planning and the infrastructure developed with the car in mind. We also need a council initiated delivery scheme (potentially given to a private entity to operate under license) where goods bought in any shop in town are delivered to the shoppers home at low cost. This would enable people to shop for anything on their bike.

6. Are you interested in working together, either with Council or other groups and organisations? happy to work with everyone where possible.

7. Do you have any other comments or thoughts?

The discussion document and goals are highly desirable outcomes but they need a rigorous top down plan to achieve them along with grassroots efforts from the community. I feel that these submission questions are framed to put the focus on the individual. I feel the greatest barriers to sustainability in Nelson can only be achieved with some top down policy changes, reprioritisation and intentional effort from the council. On a granular level we desperately need to sort out our bike lanes. The focus must change to them being considered core infrastructure not nice to have fluffy stuff. Currently our bike lanes are in many ways more dangerous than cycling on the road largely due to right of way issues. Also in part due to the locations that they suddenly end. Many of our bike lanes are much less direct than the road so are not used by the majority of cyclists. We need to capture and store our resources and energy more efficiently. The council must be active in advocating for its community opposing the content of the TPPA in its submissions to central government. We could and should be leading the country but to do this we need more than rhetoric.

I object to the policy of growth. Page 9 says "... economic wellbeing so we can attract or keep the workforce ...". Under Goal 7, page 27: "... how best to attract and retain skilled people ...", and "... attract new businesses ...". Under Goal 8 on page 29: "... great jobs attract young people to come to ...". These imply a wish to keep on the growth treadmill.

To cater for growth, there will be a continuous extra demand that will degrade Nelson's attributes.

Growth must eventually stop so we must stop growth now so we can avoid the problems it brings. In a non-growth society or a steady-state society or an equilibrium society (what ever we call it) will enable a better standard of living and standard of consumption. There be no need for house building as the unchanging population level will have enough homes; we only need to concentrate on maintenance and replacing fire damaged homes. We will have enough factories, office blocks, sports grounds, bridges, roads, stadiums, water supply, sewage works, etc for the fixed population. Avoiding the need to divert so much activity to these works, there will be more time for ourselves.

The campaign to make Nelson a nuclear free zone has helped us avoid the 3 nuclear station meltdowns of Fukushima and the desperate situation that Japan finds itself. This forward looking statement is accepted as a given now. The same firm position should be taken for making our region GM free. The promises for this technology have clearly failed and have many harmful effects where it has been introduced. The idea that our local body and people will have to carry the can for mistakes rather than the proposers is something to avoid. I understand that a Northland Council reject GM so as to avoid any consequential costs.

- 1. We commend the Nelson City Council and staff for embarking on this open-ended voyage into the future. Just as the pioneers who settled this land—both Maori and European, we set off with only a rough outline of what we want to do and what may be possible in an uncertain world that faces many interlinked and difficult decisions over the next 50 or so years. That we have been successful for so long says much for the ingenuity and hard work that our tupuna/ancestors accomplished in past centuries. However, we now have come to the realisation and need for some fundamental changes in the way we treat the land/whenua, water/wai and each other.
- 2. This rough chart (Nelson 2060) is our roadmap to the future for us and our descendants. So it is important that we endeavour to start out from the same page. We do this by agreeing on an inclusive vision and goals that are inspiring. The Vision of Nelson 2060 is such a vision. A number of us have worked on this vision and believe that it will create an inclusive, connected and beautiful city worthy of our past and positioned for the future.
- 3. Victory (both the Community Centre and the wider community) have played an active part in the Framing the Future process and in realising the goal of inclusive and connected community. We see ourselves as being on the way to a more sustainable community, both environmentally and socially, and a model for inclusive community development and involvement. Our recent award as the inaugural NZ Community of the Year shows that recognition from our peers, but also gives us something to continue to strive for. Just as Framing the Future is open-ended, community building is also open-ended and must be continually reaffirmed and evaluated. Nelson 2060 must work for all its citizens from all sectors of society.
- 4. Our focus is on improving health and well-being within Victory. We are contributing to a number of goals outlined on pages12-13 but are sometimes limited by time, capacity and resources. Our Strategic Plan recently finalised is helping us to concentrate on our mission and achievable targets, while remaining aspirational. We continue to seek mutually supportive relationships with Council and other agencies, and to examine ways in which we can reduce consumption and foster new learnings about becoming more sustainable.
- 5. We will and are taking action in a number of areas. Nelson 2060 is helpful to us as a reminder of the big picture, but needs to be broken down into a series of linked actions to move us from here (2013) to the unknown future of 2060.
- 6. We believe that one of the ways to get action on Nelson 2060 is to develop a Charter of Cooperation, and to invite people and organisations, and firms to sign up to the Charter as a sign of their commitment. Each organisation should then examine how it can best incorporate one or more of the goals into its own planning processes. Each strategic and annual plan and report should then contain indicators to report how these goals are being realised within that organisation. Council should also be part of this process and report on progress in each Annual report and in the media.

As a start we believe we can sign up to eight of the goals on the basis of our current activities, and will further examine how we can contribute to the other two goals.

- 7. We continue to be interested and committed to working with others to realise the vision of Nelson 2060. Indeed, this is the way our model of sustainable and connected community development works. We will continue to offer Victory Community Centre as venue for gatherings and meetings, to build local capacity and to involve the members of Victory community in these future oriented activities and processes.
- 8. Young people are the hope and the beneficiaries of the future. Being co-located with a primary school gives VCH an advantage to involve young people from an early age. We would like to see constructive dialogue between local schools as they strategise how best they can be involved in the Nelson 2060 Vision as it develops and grows in future years. Local schools can also be prepared to use the community and its organisations as relevant and unique learning opportunities, and together with others, help develop the young leaders of tomorrow.

Lifelong learning is also important in motivating and involving the community in more sustainable lifestyles.



If the TPPA is ratified we will effectively have much policy frozen in time (probably why changes to the RHA are being pushed through) because of the investor state dispute procedure. There is information of www.itsourfuture.org about this but the Australian experiences with plain packaging for cigarettes and the "cash for cans" debacle should ring some warning bells. In the past local councils have had success influencing government policy. It is vital that the TPPA is stopped. If NCC was to adopt the same resolution as Auckland City regarding the TPPA (document attached) others will almost certainly follow the example.

1. Framing our Future

The public consultation was first class and a fine example of democracy in action. The resulting framework document is well done and Councillors and staff are thanked for an excellent effort.

All the goals head in the right direction but I particularly support the goals relating to food security, adaption to change, renewable energy (with reservations about solar), essential needs, reduction of consumption and resource sharing.

It's appreciated that the document defines (only) a framework and I hope that Council will soon get on with prescribing, financing and implementing the actions needed to achieve the goals.

The Framework rests on a notion of the future that is ordered, lawful, functional, a society having the will and wealth to respond to the challenges ahead, particularly those posed by climate change and energy depletion. That's not at all certain.

Oil depletion is serious but surmountable, specially in NZ which is fortunate to already have ample renewable geothermal, hydro and wind generated electricity. The energy challenge is primarily to become independent of oil. The technology to do so is at hand but so far there is little evidence of the necessary political will.

The challenge posed by climate change is momentous, to the extent that it's uncertain as to whether the projected, business as usual, 4°C world is habitable. Continuing rise of local, national and global emissions indicate that so far, the battle to contain is being lost. Efforts, comparable to those made during WWII are needed. Should humanity fail to restrain and limit global warming the kind of future defined by Framing our Future will be overwhelmed. That must not be allowed to happen.

Sections 2 and 3 consider energy and climate change in detail to underscore the need for urgent action.

2. Energy

Given Nelson's relative isolation and distance from other cities,i.e. the main centers of manufacture and distribution, and the high energy demands of local primary industries, the regional economy is sensitive to the price of oil. As a result of the development of horizontal drilling and fracking*, the US is set to become energy independent and a net exporter of oil¹. It's probable the US dollar will then rise in value and the NZ/US\$ exchange rate will progressively fall to historic low levels. NZ will then pay much more for imported oil. EIA forecasts the price of oil (reference case) as rising to \$US150 (2011 dollars) around 2040².

Figure 1. U.S. domestic crude oil production by source, 1990-2040 (million barrels per day)






Figure 5. Average annual Brent spot crude oil prices in three cases, 1980-2040 (2011 dollars per barrel)

EIA sees US tight, i.e. fracked, oil production peaking early next decade and thereafter more or less constant at about 2 million bpd, only some 2% of global production. Oil prices⁴ will, as now, continue to be set by "energy-hungry economies in Asia and elsewhere". Fracking has not negated the theory of peak oil. Rather onset of decline may be delayed into the 2020's when depletion⁶ becomes significant (2005 forecast):

The 2060 Framework foresees (p.24) "economic opportunities around renewable energy such as solar and biofuels". Biofuel production anywhere in NZ is now unlikely, given the collapse of Solid Energy and its renewable energy projects and the removal of Government assistance for biofuel production.

Biofuel to gasoline using wood feedstock is a far horizon technology.

The potential for solar is overrated. Hot water heat pumps work 24/7 and are lower in installed cost than solar hot water heaters. Electric flash heaters are a lower cost solution for small households.

Although the price of thin film PV is dropping, total installation costs per KWh for households are unlikely to ever compete economically with renewable geothermal, hydro and wind generated electricity supplied through the national grid. There may be a place for local suburban scale PV generation in the future.


Nelson's real need, on environmental, economic and security of supply grounds, is to break dependence on oill. Electric battery driven vehicles offer the only feasible solution. Plug in hybrid electrics like the GM (Holden) Volt are already available. Generating capacity is ample to power the nations cars and light trucks. Council should lead and promote the introduction of electric cars (and buses) in Nelson.



3. Climate Change

Collapse in 2012 of the extent of Arctic sea ice, record breaking melting of the Greenland ice sheet, increased frequency of extreme droughts, heat waves, fire storms and rainstorm events in Australia, USA, New Zealand and elsewhere, increased methane releases from northern latitudes, rapidly warming and acidifying oceans and elevating global temperature collectively attest to a fast changing out of control global climate.



March 19, 2013 U.S. Drought Monitor __W (C)



over NZ. The associated drought has developed to become almost nationwide. Wratt (NIWA) says that "droughts are likely to become more frequent as the century progresses and high pressure belts of the subtropics expand further south and Subtropical ridge extendingencompass NZ"2. Large stationary anticyclones also prevail over the Indian Ocean and they are there permanent. A likely future summer and autumn scenario for NZ, a new normal, is one of persistent drought.

Increasingly frequent severe droughts will challenge maintenance of agricultural exports. Salinger is reported (perhaps erroneously) as saying "the current drought is historic and could spell the end of farming as we know it"³. Certainly farming faces a difficult future. Irrigation is the key and construction of more large water storage dams are vitally needed.

The Maitai dam catchment is small and whilst supply is currently adequate, it is unlikely to be sufficient during a long sequence of year upon year droughts. Local food security implies more home vegetable and fruit gardening. Water demand will then soar. It's staid that the Maitai Dam is "adequate for 50 years" ⁴, but that's for a citizenry dependent on supermarkets for food.

In the Top of the South *nothing* is more important than the construction of the Lee Dam. Without the dam commercial food production in the Waimeas will, as the impact of climate change intensifies, fail. Nelson's urban citizens will be placed at risk. The project warrants rather more enthusiastic and ambitious Council support than the present sideline stance ⁴.

That CO2 is a green house gas has been known since 1824 yet humanity has been unable to make reductions in its emissions which continue to rise. There has been a failure of democracy in that corporate interests and those of the powerful and privileged, have influenced governments world wide. NZ is no exception. Here the Emissions Trading Scheme has been gutted, NZ has opted out of the second round of Kyoto, and the Resource Management Act is to be amended to provide "balance" between competing environmental and economic demands. Historically, economic growth has always resulted in rising emissions. The tools for decoupling are known and to hand, yet economic and political considerations prevent adoption of suitable technologies at the necessary rate and of significant behavioral change. Change is imperative. Unless dramatic change is made soon the world will be locked in to a grim future, likely one at 4°C above pre-industrial according to a World Bank commissioned comprehensive study 5.

A recent Price Waterhouse study⁶ estimates "that the required improvement in global carbon intensity to meet a 2°C warming target has risen to 5.1% a year, from now to 2050." and "not once since 1950 has the world achieved that rate of decarbonization in a single year, but the task now confronting us is to achieve it for 39 consecutive years." "The 2011 rate of improvement in carbon intensity was 0.8%.." and "To give ourselves a more than 50% chance of avoiding two degrees will require a six-fold improvement in our rate of decarbonization"

The implications are stark and clear. We must radically change and use every available transition technology, waste less, grow more, consume less, travel less, buy electric cars, use public transport, walk and cycle more and have fewer children. Council could do much more to contain its own emissions and those of the community.

Thank you for the opportunity to make a submission on the Draft Nelson-2060 Strategy document.

Safe at the Top is the Nelson Tasman International Safer Communities initiative. Designation as part of this global, World Health Organisation programme took place in August 2011 and since then, Safe at the Top has undertaken several projects, worked with key stakeholders at a Strategic level and supported the work of seven task groups. These task groups, developed in response to community-identified needs include Home Safety, Road Safety, Workplace Safety, Outdoor Safety, Racism and Emerging Communities, Reducing Alcohol Related Harm and Family Violence.

Statistics provided through the ACC Community Profile, show that in the year 2011/2012. Nelson City ranked 24th out of the 72 TLAs in New Zealand in terms of ACC injury claim rates. Nelson City recorded an injury claim rate of 4,083.69 per 10,000 people compared to the New Zealand wide figure of 3,863.33. For our region, this has cost a total of 98,747 days of lost productivity¹.

Injury does not only have an impact in terms of economic terms, but as outlined in the New Zealand Injury Prevention Strategy (NZIPS) The impact of injury on individuals, families/whänau, and communities is pervasive. The social and economic costs at all levels are considerable and are estimated to be \$6-7 billion per year, yet most injuries and their consequences are preventable².

Safe at the Top would like to see the inclusion of community safety in the Nelson 2060 Strategy. The Safe at the Top Vision "Our community, leading the way to safety' complements that expressed in the Nelson 2060 document.

Safety could be a feature in the background section, fitting well under the sections:

- 'Our ageing population' where several initiatives are currently underway to support this, including falls prevention.
- 'Keeping People here and attracting new people' promoting Nelson as a safe place to work, live and play could contribute to this outcome.
- 'Planning together' -Safe at the Top works under a collaborative model at all levels of its structure, from governance level, provided by Talking Heads, through the Coalition Group, to the Task Groups.

Safety could also feature in the themes of "Outstanding lifestyles, immersed in nature and strong communities'—with work being done to improve outdoor safety and other areas which contribute to 'outstanding lifestyles'.

Safe at the Top already delivers 'successful partnerships providing good leadership' and the soon to be launched, Safe at the Top Alliance, seeks to identify leaders and extend the partnership model to businesses, organisations and groups.

Several of the goals of Nelson 2060, could also include reference to the promotion of safety and reduction of injury.

Submission on Nelson 2060 - Framing Our Future

Dr Ed Kiddle

Thank you for the opportunity to submit on the draft Nelson 2060 document. This is an individual submission. I have been involved in the process of developing the strategy through the Mayor's Taskforce.

I would like to congratulate Council and council staff on the process involved in the development of Nelson 2060. I think it was very inclusive of the community with lots of opportunity for input. I have recently looked at the Swedish system around the development of eco-municipalities (which include cities, towns and counties) and now make up about a third of all Swedish municipalities and they reflect a very similar approach to that used in the development of Nelson 2060.

Sweden has a long history of citizen participation in civic affairs. My observation around the planning process in several Swedish cities was that it has followed the process of finding a vision that reflected the views of the community looking into the future, then engaging the community in identifying the way to get to that vision All of this underpinned by principles consistent with flourishing in a sustainable environment. This is exactly what happened with the development of Framing our Future.

The description of a Swedish eco-municipality was one that has adopted a particular set of sustainability principles as guiding municipal policy and had committed to a bottom up, participatory approach for implementing this. This matches the approach being used here.

I support the rationale for the development of Nelson 2060, i.e. we need to think and work differently. Carrying on with our current model of economic growth and associated environmental destruction, along with the increasing social and economic inequity that results, is unsustainable.

The vision is very appropriate for guiding a new way of doing things. It is also consistent with the feedback from the Nelson community that occurred around the development of long-term community plans and community outcomes.

The identified goals are very relevant and reflect key areas of concern identified by the community and requiring action.

I acknowledge that Nelson 2060 is a high level document. It sets the scene that Council plans and activities should be consistent with. However, it also means that other Nelson organisations, large and small, along with individuals and families should be thinking about how they can contribute to achieving the goals identified in the document. For example I work in the District Health Board and as a key local organisation we need to see how we can do things that are consistent with sustainability principles and are part of achieving Nelson 2060.

I want to make specific comment on the identified economic goal, "that our economy thrives and contributes to a sustainable Nelson". I support the wording of this as it moves us away from the expectation of endless economic growth. Any economy that forever seeks *more* will in the end fail as natural resources are exhausted and ecological limits are exceeded. It would be inappropriate to promote a growth economy in a city strategy around sustainability. We need to shift the concept of growth away from *more* to one that reflects *enough* and concentrates on improving our quality of life and ensuring everyone in our community has their essential needs met (goal 9). In this regard we should be particularly mindful of young people and future generations. Currently we are borrowing from the future in our use of resources. This is wrong.

Goal nine is one that captures a range of health benefits that arise as Nelson 2060 is achieved. Urban planning issues impact on health eg active transport with more walking and cycling, spaces that foster community networks and interaction among locals, good well insulated houses. All of these are positive for health and wellbeing. Similar benefits arise under most of the other goals.

Goal six deserves particular comment as it covers energy, an area where the city has already started to lead and there is the willingness among a range of organisations to advance moves to increase alternative energy sources and decrease the risk we face as a community regarding electricity disruption or rising transport fuel costs. Given the interest this is an area where quite quickly we can advance actions under this goal .

It is important to note the need to move to a low carbon economy. We need to decrease carbon emissions. Climate change has been named a by the Director General of the World Health Organisation as the largest public health threat we face this century. As a city we can model the necessary responses and behaviour and this in turn stimulates further action, both locally, nationally and internationally. Given the impact of climate change on our pacific neighbours it is important for us the demonstrate action in this area.

I strongly support the framework Nelson 2060 is built on, The Natural Step. The identified sustainability principles are straight forward, have a solid scientific and social equity base and provide a logical system to guide actions following on under this strategy. They are the same as the principals used in the Swedish eco-municipality movement and this has generated significant change in areas such as alternative energy, recycling, food production, transport, housing and urban design. In addition they have been used in transforming other types of organisations, for example businesses, throughout the world.

I think measuring our progress is important. The statements around "how we will know we are getting there" in relation to the goals are quite high level and we need specific actions that we can map as we progress. I support the use of a set of indicators and the development of a graphical way of presenting this to aid the process. We need to reflect back to the Nelson community how we are going in achieving Nelson 2060 and use these progress reports to stimulate further discussion and action.

Once again, congratulations on the development of this strategy. It's a very good start to what I hope is increasing momentum down a path to true prosperity for the region.

SUBMISSION TO NELSON CITY COUNCIL ON 'NELSON 2060'

- 1.1. Federated Farmers appreciates the opportunity to submit on the document 'Nelson 2060'.
- 1.2. Our interest in 'Nelson 2060' arises from the importance of Nelson as an economic, social and cultural centre. Nelson City anchors the whole of the top of the south and it is in everyone's interest that it develops as a vibrant and prosperous place to work and live as we move into the 21st Century.
- 1.3. The current global socio-political environment is very challenging and subject to rapid change. Industries and economic activities that are economically competitive today may not be tomorrow, and it is very hard to accurately predict future trends or outcomes. The only certainty is uncertainty. We must build resilience into our communities so that we are able to manage change. To achieve this, the community first and foremost requires economic prosperity, flexible and enabling regulation, and confidence that Nelson is more than just an aspirational place to live.
- 1.4. Federated Farmers are concerned about the region wide prescriptive requirements of the document such as controlling land and water resources outside of the Nelson City area, designing for a low carbon economy costs and benefits, 'creating economic opportunities based on providing affordable food', and 'reducing consumption so that resources are shared more fairly'. These aspirational goals are promoted with little more than general ideas as to how they might be achieved. Nelson 2060 may be a highly desirable and aesthetically attractive place to work and live but will be of little value to people, particularly our young people, without appropriate employment growth opportunities that offer more than sunshine wages. Prescriptive interventions are as likely to hobble growth as they are to enhance social wellbeing.
- 1.5. Nelson 2060 does little to address known demographic challenges, for both young and old, associated with an aging population. The strategy does not address the lack of opportunities for young people to prosper through a high value regional economy and attain ownership of their own house, even though these are key threats to the future prosperity of Nelson city. The lack of affordable land for housing in Nelson coupled with high housing costs are key threats to the resilience of the Nelson community because it transfers vital capital away from the productive economy and innovative investment into an unaffordable housing market. Young Nelson people who are struggling to achieve life-goals locally, frequently take their energy, skills, and ambition elsewhere.
- 1.6. Nelson 2060 also under emphasises Nelsons connection to nearby regions. Nelson city is a critical port and social and economic centre that anchors the top of the South. It is inappropriate to consider the future aspirations of Nelson without commitment from the whole of the Top of the South. In particular Nelson 2060 needs to focus on provision of infrastructure integration with Tasman District and Marlborough, and taking an enabling approach to growth so that communities are able to provide for their own wellbeing.

Decisions Sought:

- 1.7. Federated Farmers seeks that Nelson 2060 is revised to:
 - Enhance the importance of economic prosperity, flexible and enabling regulation, and confidence that Nelson is resilient to change and more than just an aspirational place to live;
 - Remove prescriptive recommendations based on assumptions as to what will happen in the future and that intervene to an inappropriate extent in the activities of people;
 - Specifically address issues with lack of opportunities for youth, including an unaffordable housing market and barriers to capital investment and innovation;
 - Specifically address demographic challenges associated with an ageing population;
 - Focus on the essential role of Nelson as an economic and social centre for the top of the south, including the critical importance of the primary productive sectors, the port and connecting infrastructure.
